





3rd Annual Sunshine Gala


Getting started is simple:

- Distribute your #SunlandRocks around the Sunland community. Public recreation areas, parks, well-traveled areas are recommended. Be mindful and only place in safe areas.
- Keep the community updated on painting projects, hiding, or finding these special #SunlandRocks by taking photos, forwarding photos to Sunland Communications Coordinator Beth Basford, and tagging with the hashtag. It will be fun to see your photos in future editions of the Sunland Beacon!
- Staff are encouraged to take their #SunlandRocks with them when they travel, and leave a piece of Sunland for others to find and share.




Enjoying the Sunfest Sensation!

APD Employees Recipients of Prudential Productivity Awards



Sunland Administration extends congratulations to two staff who were recently honored as 2017 Prudential Productivity Award recipients. Each year, Prudential and The Florida Tax Watch recognize state employees who combine their creativity and innovation to improve and deliver state services in a more efficient manner. Congratulations to Jennie Ann Dean, Resident Advocate at Sunland, and Lori Keel, Accountant IV at Sunland's Developmental Disabilities Defendant Program, located in Chattahoochee. On June 14, these ladies were recognized at the 29th annual Prudential Productivity Awards luncheon held at the Donald L. Tucker Civic Center in Tallahassee. Both were presented with engraved plaques for their achievements.

Ms. Dean is the Resident Advocate at Sunland Center. She ensures the rights and needs of the individuals served at Sunland Center are provided without exception. In addition to her duties, she consistently goes above and beyond her scope of duty to search out and develop occasions that allow Sunland residents opportunities to engage in socially enriching and meaningful activities. Ms. Dean works tirelessly to enrich the lives of the individuals who reside at Sunland, advocating for opportunities that will enhance their life experiences. A couple of years ago, Ms. Dean became aware of the "Night to Shine" event sponsored by the Tim Tebow Foundation, which enhances social engagement for people with developmental disabilities. She recognized this would be a wonderful occasion for the individuals who reside at Sunland, as well as others with developmental disabilities from our local and surrounding communities. She worked to procure an \$8,000 grant from the Tebow Foundation to bring the event to the Marianna community. She established a committee of volunteers from Sunland Center and the local community, partnering with Rivertown Community Church and community businesses to ensure all needs were met. Through "Night to Shine," Ms. Dean's efforts improved community integration activities for Sunland and increased positive community relations for The Agency for Persons with Disabilities/Sunland Center.

Ms. Keel serves as an Accountant IV at the Developmental Disabilities Defendant Program (DDDP). She understands individuals who have a wider array of choices, are at lower risk for maladaptive behaviors, in turn, being more open to learning opportunities. Ms. Keel recognized the DDDP residents needed more appealing activities and took the initiative to institute a plan of action to secure surplus computers, at no cost to the state, saving approximately \$5,000 had the computers been purchased new. The use of computers affords residents new opportunities to engage in educational computer games and activities. Through her efforts, freeware games and basic academic skills programs were made available for the residents at DDDP. By her actions, Ms. Keel went far above and beyond her job duties and responsibilities to meet the needs of the residents at DDDP.

Team Awarded for Lifesaving Action

On June 7 a Star Team award was present to Mr. Terrell Manuel, Ms. Tanya B. Jones, and Mr. Carlos Ardila for their actions in responding to an emergency medical situation. Thanks to their swift response, resident T.H. is alive and well today. Mr. Manuel observed resident T.H. having what appeared to be seizure activity and quickly took appropriate action ensuring the resident was safe, notifying Ms. Jones to call for medical assistance. Ms. Jones promptly notified nursing staff, Mr. Ardila of the medical situation. Mr. Ardila immediately responded to the scene to find resident T.H. in acute medical distress, no palpable pulse and no observable respirations. He instructed the staff to activate EMS and immediately initiated CPR. CPR was continued by nurse Ardila until resident T.H. displayed spontaneous respiration and a palpable pulse was felt. FHS EMS arrived on the scene and transported the resident to Unit 31ER. Because of the keen observation, rapid notification, and expeditious reaction and action of this team, resident T.H. was provided necessary lifesaving intervention and has been able to make a full recovery with no loss of function. Congratulations team for a job well done!

HUMAN RESOURCES

BACKGROUND SCREENINGS - With the new background screening system in the Clearinghouse, it is ESSENTIAL that all communications you may receive via email, standard and/or certified mail etc., from the Department of Children and Families (DCF) and/or Agency for Health Care Administration (AHCA) regarding any background screening information be addressed as outlined in the communication you receive as quickly as possible. These communications are not sent to Human Resources; they are sent to the employee directly. If you bring a copy of the communication received to HR we will assist you with providing any copies of documents needed that we may already have on file or have access to. Please do not ignore these communications as it may affect employment eligibility status regardless of your hire date or service time.

PAY RAISES - Effective October 1, 2017, eligible employees are employees who, at a minimum, meet their required performance standards, if applicable, and are employed on October 1, 2017. Other Personal Services (OPS) employees are not eligible for a competitive pay adjustment.

For employees with a base rate of pay of \$40,000 or less on September 30, 2017, an annual increase of \$1,400.

For employees with a base rate of pay greater than \$40,000 on September 30, 2017, an annual increase of \$1,000; provided however, in no instance shall an employee's base rate of pay be increased to an annual amount less than \$41,400.

For part-time employees, the full-time equivalent value of the base rate of pay on September 30, 2017, shall be used, but the amount of the annual increase for a part-time employee shall be proportional to the full-time equivalency of the employee's position.
