


#### Quick Guide: Applying for APD Services

The below are pre-screening items that the Agency for Persons with Disabilities (APD) uses to determine eligibility for APD services. APD may request additional information or documentation in order to complete your application.





In many instances, the Agency for Persons with Disabilities (APD) can verify Florida residency for applicants through information provided on the application form. If necessary, APD may request additional information or documentation to verify residency.

Identity and Domicile Verification	Examples of Documents That May Be Needed
For all applicants:	One or more of the following documents may be needed:  Copy of Birth Certificate Social Security Card A copy of a valid Florida driver's license U.S. Passport Federal, state, or local government issued photo ID School Photo ID (accepted for children under the age of 16) A military dependent's ID card Certificate of Indian Blood Native American tribal document  Parents of applicants under the age of 18 can submit one of the following: U.S. military card or draft record, U.S. Coast Guard Merchant Mariner card, federal, state, or local government issued photo ID
Applicants born in another country who do not have US Citizenship, provide the following:	Please submit the immigration documentation that shows your status as a resident alien, qualified alien, or legal immigration status, and proof of domicile in Florida.

Applicants applying under autism	Must provide one or more of both diagnostic testing and collateral documentation. Examples are listed below. Please provide all testing and documentation you have available.  Diagnostic Testing Examples: The following evaluations are some examples of tests used to make a diagnosis of autism:  • ADOS-2: Autism Diagnostic Observation Schedule, Second Edition • GARS-3: Gilliam Autism Rating Scale • CARS-2: Childhood Autism Rating Scale • ASRS: Autism Spectrum Rating Scales • ADI-R: Autism Diagnostic Inventory Revised  Collateral Documentation Examples:  • School records, such as Individualized Education Plans and achievement testing • Medical or therapeutic documentation • Any psychological evaluation, educational evaluation, or adaptive testing • Progress notes from speech and behavioral therapies • Baker Act records	evaluator is licensed through the same credentials required for licensure in Florida for the professions.

Applicants between the ages of 3-5 at high risk for a developmental disability	<ul> <li>Must provide supporting information to document one or more of the items below:</li> <li>A developmental delay in cognition, language, or physical development.</li> <li>A child surviving a catastrophic infectious or traumatic illness known to be associated with developmental delay.</li> <li>A child with a parent or guardian with developmental disabilities who requires assistance in meeting the child's developmental needs.</li> <li>A child who has a physical or genetic anomaly associated with developmental disability.</li> </ul> APD may assist with providing individual evaluations or assessments necessary for the diagnosis of a developmental disability. Please reach out to APD if you need assistance scheduling a comprehensive evaluation.	Documentation from a physician or doctor of osteopathy attesting to the indicators identified.     Medical treatment records or visit summaries that indicate the items above.     Medical history records that indicate the items above.

#### What should I do after gathering the necessary documentation above?

- Complete and submit the application to APD. You may submit to a local APD office that is near you.

  - Don't forget to sign the application!

- Once APD receives the application, the applicant will receive an acknowledgement of receipt.

#### What should I expect after an application has been submitted?

- APD will begin reviewing the application and may contact you for additional information or documentation.
- Once the application has been reviewed, APD will contact you on next steps.
