Sunland & DDDP Host Legislative Tour

Sunland and the Developmental Disabilities Defendant Program (DDDP) hosted a legislative delegation tour on Tuesday, June 26. Visitors included Caleb Hawkes, APD Director of Legislative Affairs; Rebeca Grissom, APD Deputy Director of Legislative Affairs; Zoe Linafelt, APD Deputy Communications Director; Peter Delia, Senior Attorney Florida Senate, Committee on Children, Families, And Elder Affairs; Bryan E. Mielke, MPA Budget Analyst, Health Care Appropriations Subcommittee; Oaj Gilani, Attorney Analyst, Health and Human Services Committee, Florida House of Representatives; and Brook Gerbrandt, Budget Analyst, Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Health and Human Services .

The group toured educational, recreational and vocational programming areas, as well as residential homes in Units 1, 2 and 3, Cox Medical, and Pathways. During the afternoon hours, they visited DDDP, touring various areas of the forensics program.



Mission San Luis Pine Needle Basket Class

Students from the Hub art class, along with staff Maria Johnson and Jennie Ann Dean, visited Mission San Luis, in Tallahassee, on Saturday, June 9.

According to the Mission San Luis website, the mission is a National Historic Landmark, and is the only reconstructed 17th century mission in the Southeast. At Mission San Luis, meticulous reconstructions of Apalachee Indian and Spanish structures re-create a community that disappeared three centuries ago. Costumed interpreters welcome groups and guide them on a visit to a place where time stands still. The skills and activities of the 17th century are demonstrated while the sights and sounds of mission life mingle with the smell of wood smoke. At Mission San Luis, the entire site is a classroom where lifelong learning and fun take place.

While there, Sunland's Hub art students enjoyed participating in a Pine Needle Basket Making Class. They learned that pine needle basketry is one of the oldest-known coiled basketry techniques, and one which many cultures have practiced. They observed the basic techniques of making coils from pine needles and stitching them together with natural fibers to make a simple basket. They especially enjoyed the scent of the pine needles used in making the basket and touring the facility.

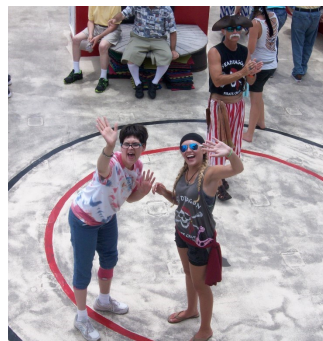
Unit 1 Pirate Ship Adventure
